The accomplishments we have already seen to date are significant; annual good food boxes or low cost food market during the summer months, a backpack program and new community partnerships are a few good examples. We look forward to continuing to share the achievements of SHARE365 with you next year as it continues to grow.

This along with everything else happening at BBNC was a massive undertaking and could not have been accomplished without the dedication and effort of the staff and volunteers. The Board would like to take this opportunity to once again thank you for all of your efforts this past year, BBNC would not be what it is today without your support and commitment.

Message from the Executive Director

As I mentioned in prior reports one of the most difficult things to do is to report on a year of operations that ended over six months ago. However BBNC’s Annual General Meeting has been held in September for the last 30 years. BBNC has been celebrating its accomplishments six months into the following operating year. Although it is not easy, perhaps it is more difficult to try to change such an old tradition. Because of that we are often tempted to share with you accomplishments and news that happened after the year we are closing. Thus please forgive us and understand our enthusiasm in sharing our stories with you.

The year, for which, we are reporting began on April 1, 2015 and ended on March 31, 2016. It was a successful and challenging year. It was a year in which some of the needed streamlining happened and we were able to consolidate programming to serve the community better. One important accomplishment was the shift of our beloved “*Share Christmas Program*” from an intense but limited service to a **Poverty Reduction Strategy** lead by a courageous group of volunteers to address in a systemic way the challenges of poverty through the year in our needed and committed but limited area of service. As such SHARE365 was launched. From the new name to the service delivery BBNC is determined to address systemic challenges members in the community struggle with daily, addressing needs such as adequate diet, stress relief, children’s programming, etc. So we took up the challenge! Another no less important accomplishment through the year was the consolidation and new partnerships of service providers working in coordination to implement and address common needs of the community, knowing that we are stronger together!

Another great accomplishment was the consolidation of the Community Engagement Award. The Community Engagement Award (CEA) recognises community members for their contributions in making South West Scarborough a better place. The CEA recognises the commitment to grass roots movements fueling the concept of Neighbourhood Centres. BBNC, as an organization in South West Scarborough, governed by the community for the community, instituted the award as a vehicle to celebrate these grass roots movements and people that in giving so much expect so little. Recognising Scarborough residents who contribute their time, energy and, their love for this corner of the city.

This year our AGM theme is “Poverty Reduction Strategy”. The City of Toronto launched the strategy and BBNC took it up on itself to develop its own approach. BBNC is committed to implement and consolidate services aimed to address the inequities of our society. Perhaps it is naïve to believe BBNC is going to “resolve” the reality and causes of poverty but we are not going to stay idle by not contributing to the need for change in a society so wealthy and resilient.

Regardless of your political views, sympathies, likes and dislikes of a politician, what is important to express is our concerns and wishes to our elected officials. After all, in a democratic process each elected official represents you, whether you agreed or not with their political vision. The fact remains that an elected official is there to serve all the community. It’s every day that the elected officials are held accountable to their actions in managing the public good.

Perhaps one may not be able to influence all the changes we need in order to fulfill the dream of an inclusive diverse society where all of us are not only equal in society, but the society is a place where equity is the rule not the exception. Nonetheless, if there is any hope for change for a better future, one must participate not only in a democratic political process but to be committed to work towards the reduction of poverty. 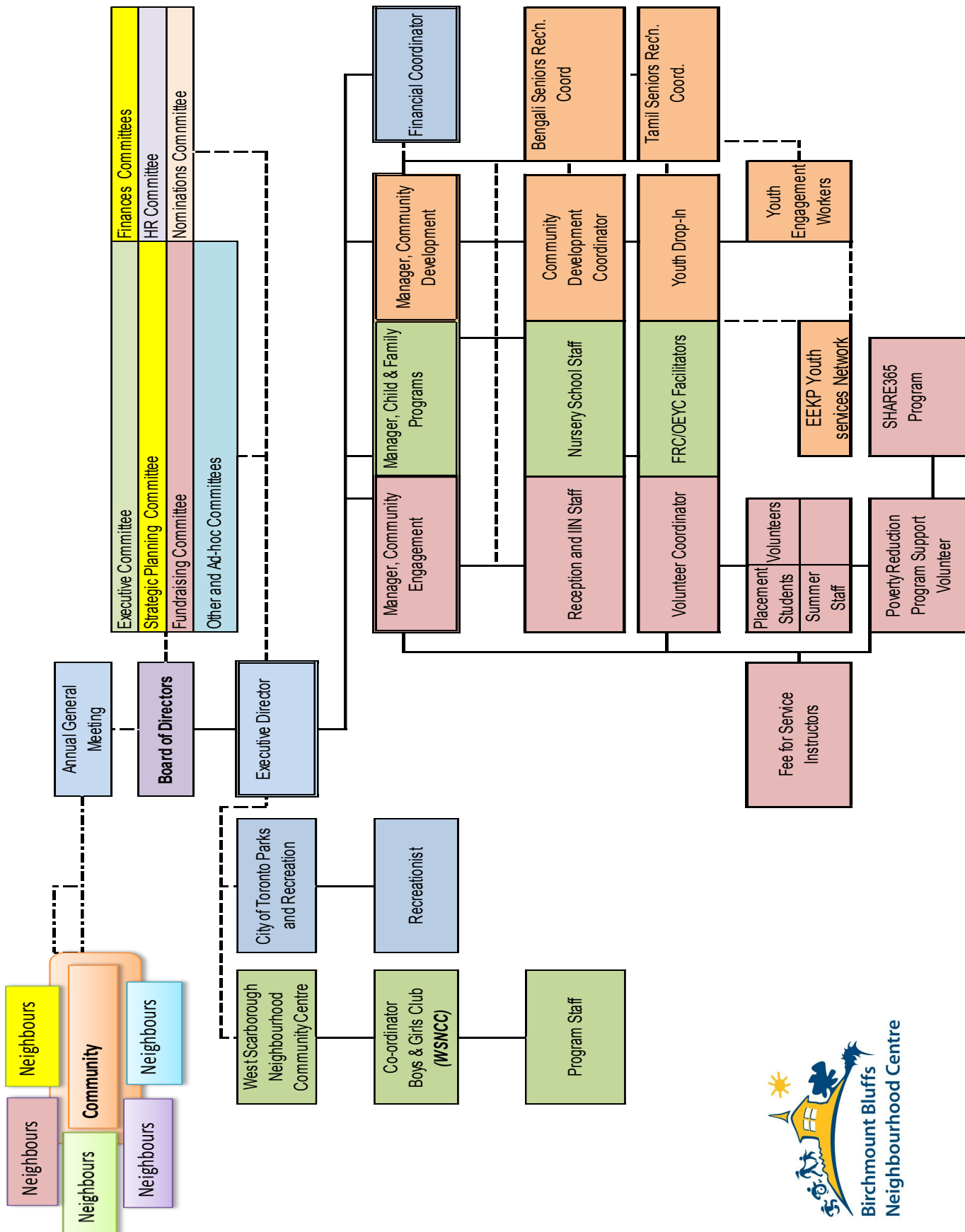

BBNC Programs and Services

Family Resource Centre

The Family Resource Centre (FRC) provides programs, resources and services for parents/guardians, child care providers and children aged 5 and under. An annual membership of \$40 is required for participation in FRC programming.



Ontario Early Years Centre (unique satellite location):

The Ontario Early Years Centre (OEYC) provides programming for children 0 to 6 years of age, parents/guardians, and child care providers. BBNC offers various programs that are both interactive and independent with a skill development focus on exploration of the senses, literacy, and social skills such as sharing, turn taking and cooperating while interacting within a group. Membership is free of charge. Prior to attendance, participants are required to pre-register.

Preschool Programs

BBNC offers a variety of programs for children 2-and-a-half to 5 years of age to attend on their own, led by instructors.

Nursery School

BBNC operates a licensed Nursery School program that functions 37 weeks annually from September-June. We offer morning classes Mon-Thurs 9-11:30am and afternoon classes Mon/Wed 1-3pm. Our staff are qualified educators who devote their time, patience and knowledge to child development.

Children's Programs

In partnership with West Scarborough Neighbourhood Centre, we offer a Boys and Girls Club. Its social, recreational and educational activities emphasize fair play and leadership. In addition, BBNC also offers Karate.

Youth Programs

Birchmount Bluffs Neighbourhood Centre (BBNC) is committed to supporting area youth to overcome barriers and achieve successful life pathways. We offer a Youth Employment Program (YEP) at our main site and a satellite Youth Drop-in Centre. This ever expanding and growing youth program features a wide range of services, including social drop-in programs, a youth advisory committee, and an employment lounge.

Drop-in Programs

Our centre's dynamic drop-in programs offer a relaxed space where youth age 14 to 24, can enjoy recreation, socialization, self-expression and discussion. Our Drop-In Centre is located at: **2849 Kingston Road** (at St. Clair Ave.) and is open Monday to Friday 12:00 pm to 6:00 pm. Call us at **416-264-1007**.

Eglinton East Kennedy Park Youth Service Providers Network

Comprised of youth and youth serving agencies serving the Eglinton East-Kennedy Park area. Funded by the City of Toronto's Social Development and Investment Program, the project supported engagement, access and capacity building for area youth and residents.



BBNC Programs and Services

Adult Fitness & Wellness Programs

For those interested in fitness and wellness programs, a wide array of classes taught by qualified instructors is available. To facilitate choice, classes are offered in both the daytime and evening, and many are designed to accommodate persons of different physical ability levels.

Older Adult Programs

Older Adult Programs at BBNC welcome the participation of community members from all backgrounds and with diverse abilities. The programming, with direction from our Older Adult Advisory Council, strives to meet the physical, social, and recreational needs of adults aged 60+, and works to develop a strong sense of community among its members.

SOAR

Seniors Outreach Ambassador Resource (SOAR) project engages seniors as trained volunteers who outreach to isolated and excluded seniors in southwest Scarborough, helping them link them to community activities.

Bengali & Tamil Seniors Recreation Program

Bengali and Tamil Seniors Recreational Program is a consortium led initiative that offers area seniors from these communities, culturally responsive recreational and wellness programming at 4 southwest Scarborough sites.

Active & Able Programs

Active and Able Programs provide inclusive services and programs that advance active living, independence and full inclusion for persons with disabilities and health barriers. The program offers access to several integrated and adapted wellness, recreational, capacity building and social programs.

Community Development Program

The Community Development Program works with residents, community groups and partner agencies to improve progressive social policy and action on key issues such as poverty, unaffordable housing, food insecurity and barriers to accessing community services.

At the organizational and program levels, we partner to offer residents facing barriers with skills training, inclusive health programming, leadership and civic engagement opportunities that enhance community engagement, inclusion and social change.

BBNC's partners in this work include Commitment2Community, Social Planning Toronto and the Toronto Neighbourhood Network.

SHARE365

SHARE365 is BBNC's new poverty reduction strategy focusing on individuals and families in Southwest Scarborough living in poverty. Supports are provided in terms of access to healthy foods; opportunities for improved wellness for all ages; as well as, educational opportunities for all (Nursery School, trainings and certifications, skill building, etc.)

Volunteer Program

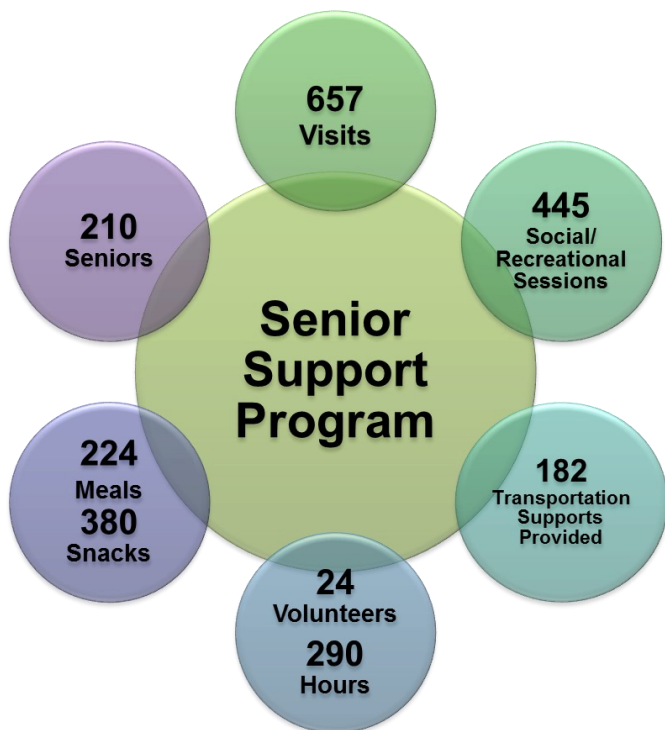
BBNC's Volunteer Program offers all ages opportunities to connect and strengthen this community. BBNC has adopted the Canadian Code for Volunteer Involvement and believes in meaningful and inclusive engagement of volunteers in the daily programs and services offered through BBNC. Volunteerism is an organizational responsibility and the CCVI provides the path to follow. BBNC commits to value and support the contribution of Volunteers



RESPECT

One way service providers can show respect to seniors is by offering avenues for them to share their rich skills and lived experiences. In recent years, BBNC increasingly did this through peer-led seniors programs. Last year, our *Curious Cooks Club* met weekly and dished out healthy culturally diverse meals, while building friendships, wellness and great peer leadership. In our Seniors Ambassador program, over 15 trained seniors unleashed leadership, outreaching to isolated area seniors, running Seniors' Cafes, volunteering at BBNC special events such as our annual BBQ.

DIVERSITY

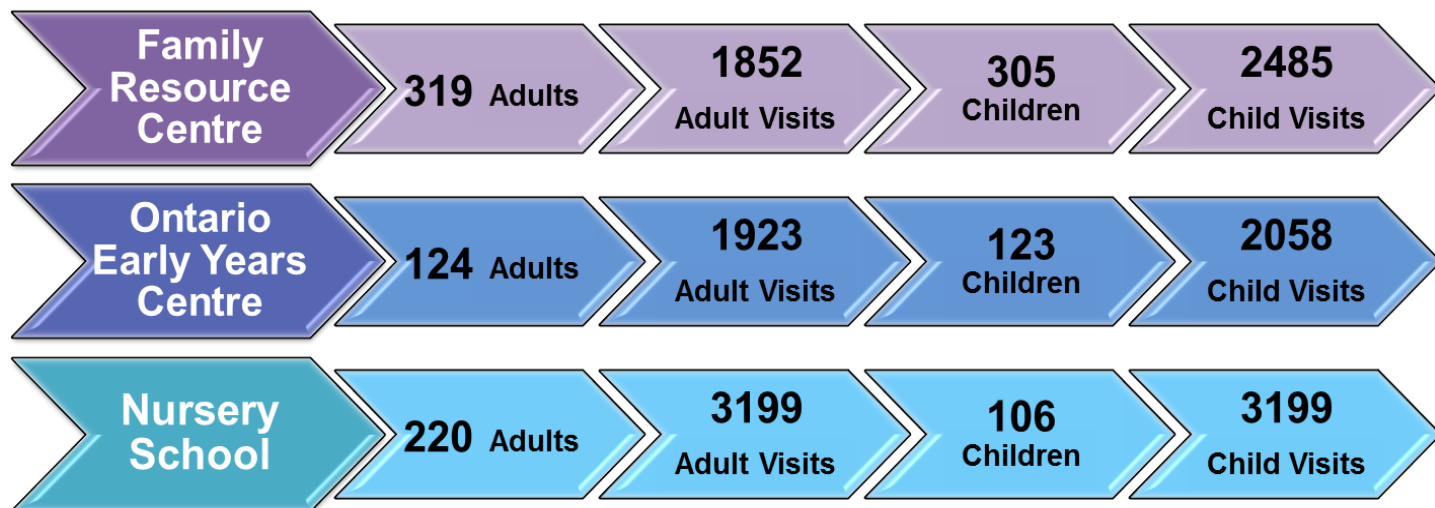

My daughter has been attending Birchmount Bluffs Neighbourhood Centre (BBNC) for over 2 years now enjoying classes such as Art Start, Rhyme Time, Story Time, Cooking, and First Steps as well as attending the Community Nursery School program of afternoon class this past school year. She has developmental delays, and in the times she has been coming to BBNC programming her overall gross and fine motor skills is much better.

The program staff report during the Art Start classes she has been learning eye and hand coordination skills and developing her own techniques while also learning about colours, art materials and textures. During Rhyme & Story Times she has learned lots of new songs and memorizing words, she speaks much clearer and sings along with the songs too. Her language has developed so well including following instructions, listening and the concept of taking turns. During the First Steps program she enjoys doing the actions to songs and rhymes at the large group circle time. While attending cooking classes she enjoyed mixing recipe ingredients and taking turns stirring with her friends. She loves interacting with her friends while making different types of foods, and even has begun tasting new foods.

The family specifies; "We are so thankful for the help and love she has received from all of the staff at BBNC and are thrilled for our daughter to be ready now to attend Jr. Kindergarten this fall!"

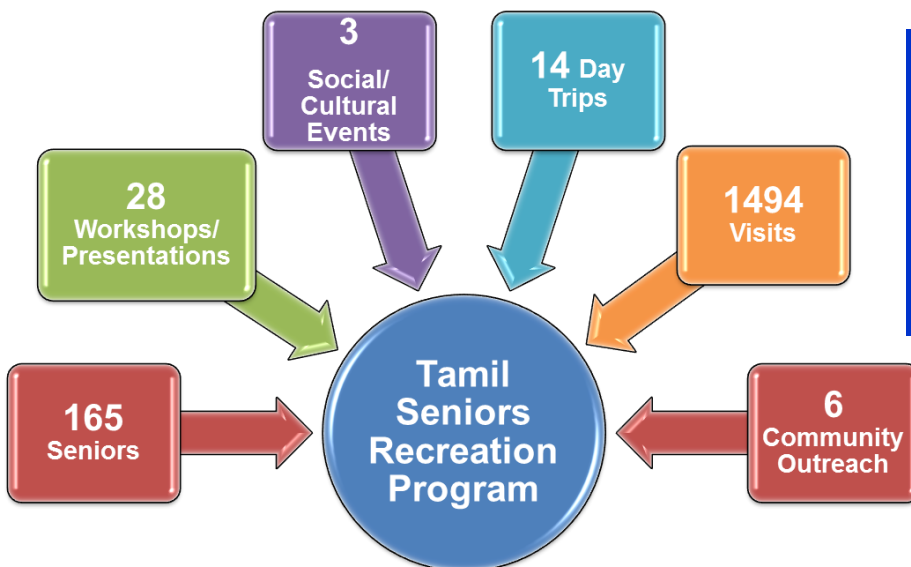




INCLUSIVITY

We actively seek ways to welcome all members of our community and ensure they have the opportunity to participate in meaningful ways.

When newcomers are supported to engage in our neighbourhoods' civic life, many will join fellow residents in working to build just, stronger communities. This was the case this past year with many of BBNC's Bengali Program seniors. With support from our CD program, many seniors participated in civic trainings, rallies, democracy festivals and City budget campaigns, advancing their civic voices for social change on issues like affordable housing, fairer transit and poverty reduction. "With all these activities I have been able to engage in," says Amal, a Bengali senior, "I feel included and clearly see that my voice can make a difference."

EQUITABLE ACCESS

We commit to removing barriers that restrict individuals and groups from accessing services and participating in our programs.



In the past year, our Active and Able Program and disability sector partners supported people with a wide range of disabilities to animate their voices for increased accessibility in Toronto. We partnered to run 2 consultations on Toronto's Poverty Reduction Strategy, a civic literacy project and a federal election forum on disability issues. The community response was tremendous as people with disabilities participated in large numbers, sharing their lived experiences of access barriers and advancing great ideas for solutions.

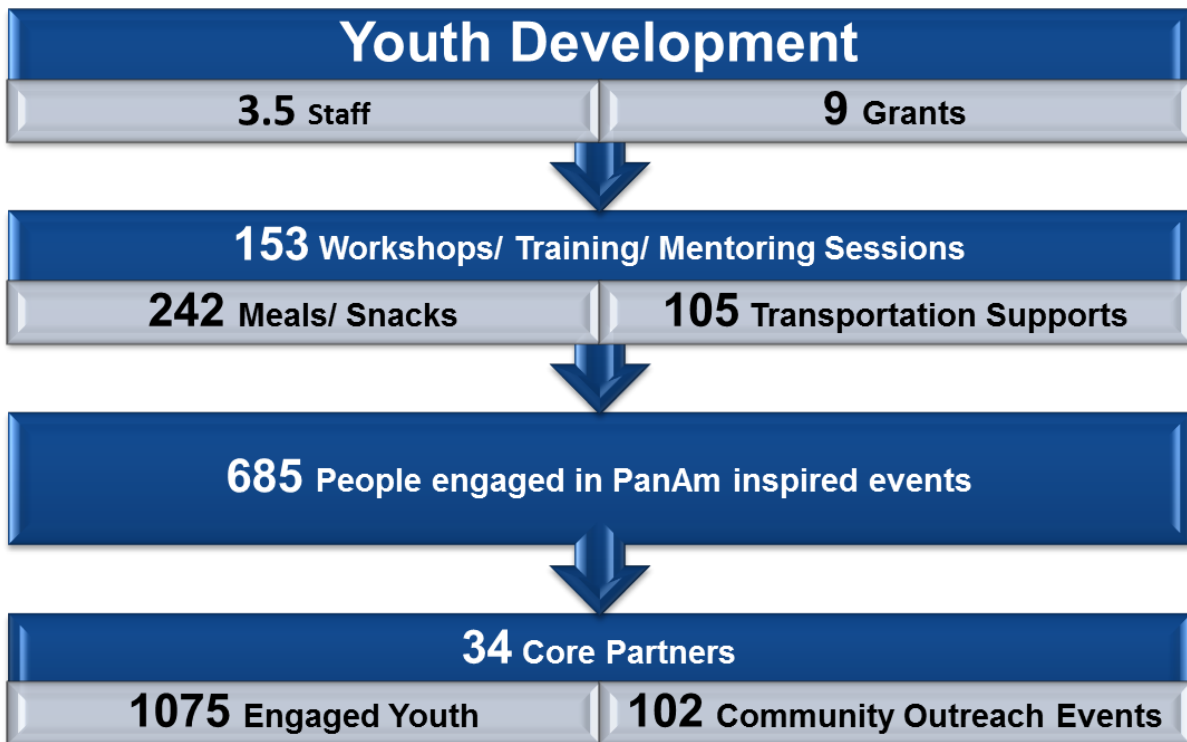
Active and Able continued to respond to the demand for more accessible recreation. Over 190 participants accessed up to 16 inclusive recreational programs. Through our Expanding the Reach project, many women with disabilities strengthened their ability to lead healthy empowered lives through leadership trainings and workshops.

In its 4th year of building youth capacity, the EEKP Youth Services Providers Network is a great example of collaboration in action. During the year, this network of more than 20 agencies, trusted by BBNC, brought these communities together, running a Pan Am Games project in area neighbourhoods, several high school Road Shows, Pop UP BBQ's and community meetings, serving a total of over 1075 youth and residents in these underserved neighbourhoods.

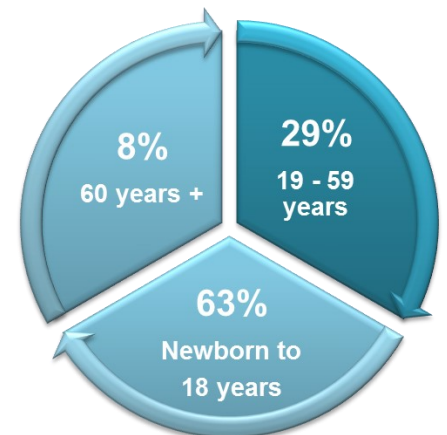
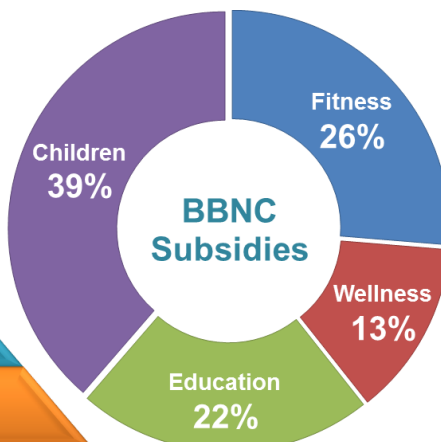
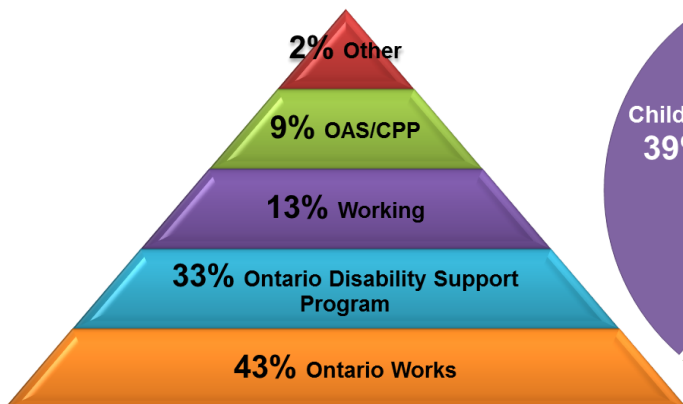


INTEGRITY

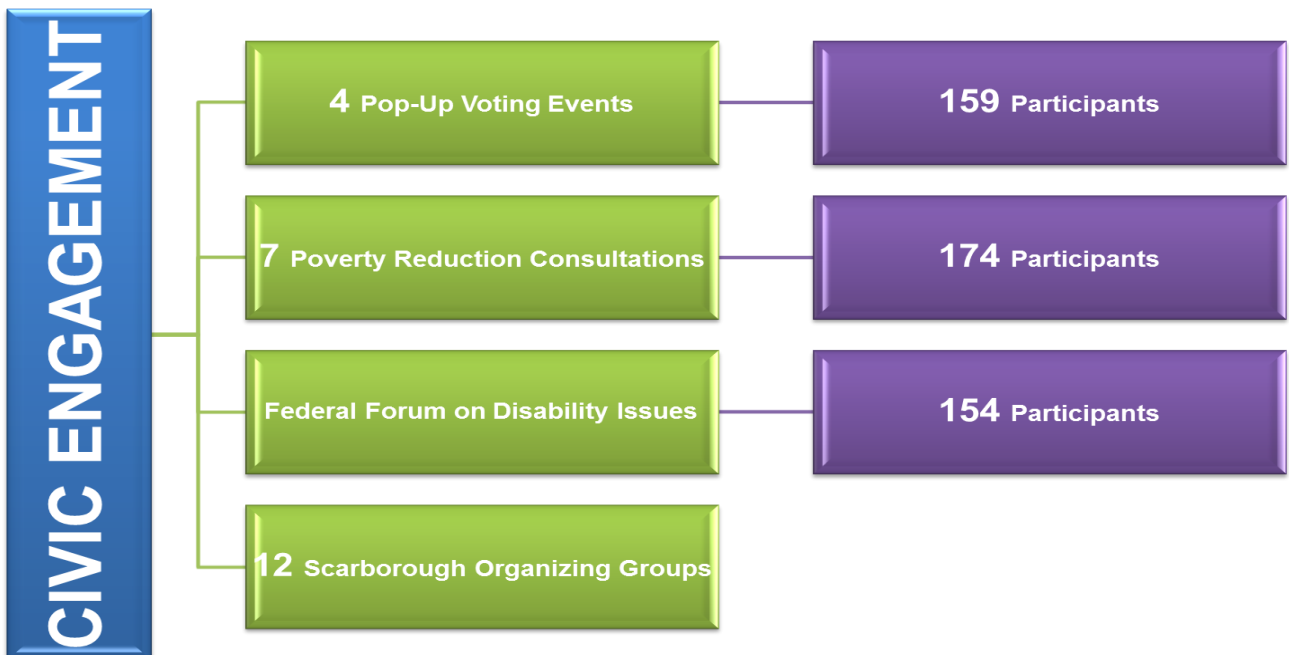
ACCOUNTABILITY

In the past year, BBNC supported over 400 residents and many groups to engage in the federal electoral process, Toronto's poverty Reduction Strategy and the City budget process. At several consultations, Vote PopUPs and forums, residents facing barriers from diverse communities advanced their voices on key community issues such as unaffordable housing and rising poverty.

“Before I began speaking at events during these past months, I didn't think my voice counted,” said Ali, a recent immigrant senior. “But I have seen firsthand that with training and supports, my voice can make a difference, that I can help bring about the kind of caring city I want my grandchildren to live in.”

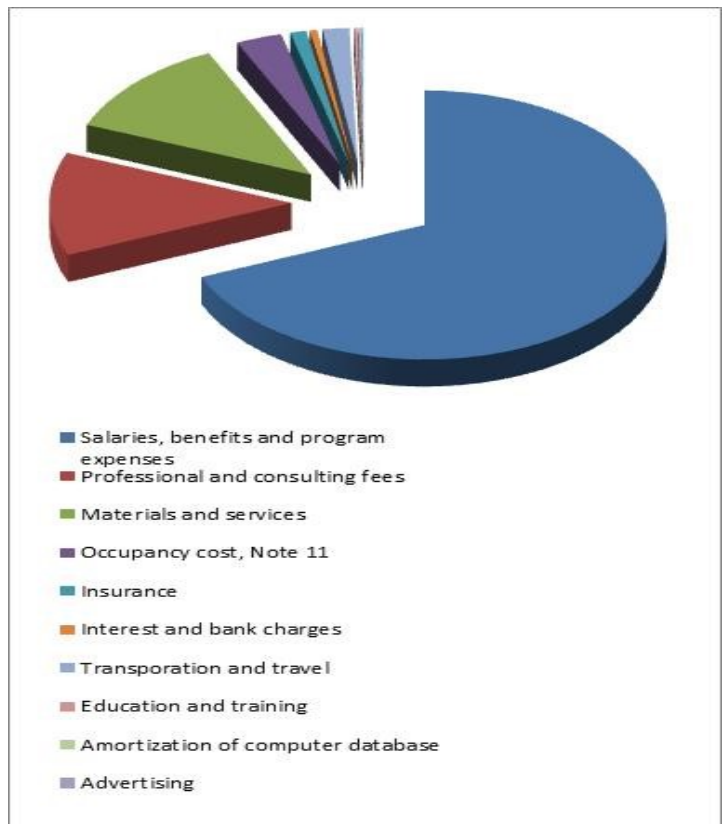
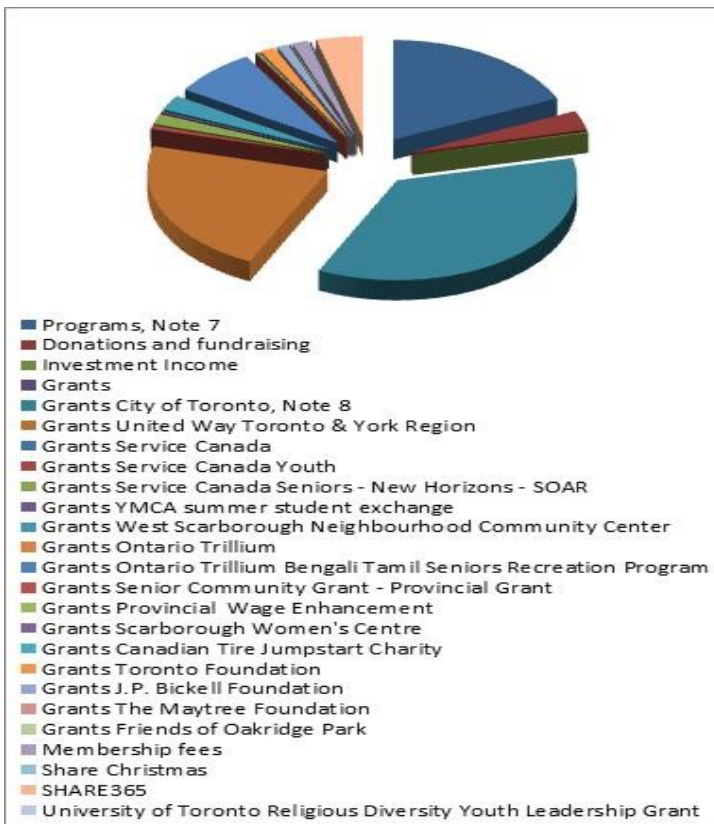
